INTRODUCTIONS AND APPROVAL OF MEETING MINUTES

TOOL TO QUANTIFY IMPROVEMENT INITIATIVES

The QIC discussed a prototype improvement tool that was introduced to the QIC in May 2015. The tool quantifies and helps tell a story about how quality improvement can make a difference (for example, the number of life years that could be saved if we improved the statewide rate of colon cancer screening by 5%). The statistical methods used to model the improvement tool for colon, cervical, and breast cancer screening measures were presented briefly. Following the meeting, the materials will be emailed to QIC members for a thorough review in anticipation of a full discussion and vote at the October 8 QIC meeting.

PRACTICE TRANSFORMATION HUB

The majority of the meeting involved a facilitated discussion of the Practice Transformation Hub, one of the main building blocks of Healthier Washington. The Practice Transformation Hub, being organized and coordinated by the state's Department of Health, is modeled after a "spoke and wheel" concept, where the Hub coordinates work being done across the state and support is provided at the local-level through extension agents. Approximately \$9.5 million (from the state's \$65 million State Innovation Model grant) is dedicated to the development of the Hub. The goal of the Hub is to go deep in three improvement areas, rather than being spread across a multitude of topics, which include: *improve clinical-community linkages, develop medical group readiness for value-based payment, and integration of physical and behavioral health services.* Similar listening sessions are being conducted around the state and the QIC is seen as a key conduit to health care leaders across the state.
